

In Memory of the Sanborn's



Richard "Dick" and Cleo Sanborn were longtime residents of Raymond who loved giving back to the community and helping those in need. Dick and Cleo were married in April of 1975 and together shared 12 children. They ran a small farm on North Raymond Road where they raised French Alpine goats and sold milk and fresh eggs to support their family. In 2020 Dick and Cleo were presented with the Spirit of America award for their continued and selfless service to the members of our community.

Dick was the Town of Raymond's Cemetery Sexton for many years - he marked grave sites, helped the monument companies to place stones on the proper plots, participated in the Cemetery Committee activities, and dug many graves. He knew most of the people he buried and who they were, related to and could usually tell a nice or funny story about each! Dick also mowed the Town properties (including cemeteries and roadside) and kept the Town sidewalks clear in the winter. His help to the Town of Raymond was indispensable.

Cleo loved being a homemaker where you could find her tending to the garden, quilting, or in the kitchen trying new recipes or making her locally famous homemade goat's milk ricotta cheese.

Cleo passed away in December and Dick passed in March, just a few short months after his beloved wife. Dick and Cleo's presence and giving spirits will be greatly missed amongst the Raymond community and they will be remembered as two people who loved helping others, loved each other, loved their children, and loved God.


Articles 24 and 25 for the Raymond Village Library to Become a Raymond Town Department!

DID YOU KNOW THE RAYMOND VILLAGE LIBRARY IS NOT A TOWN DEPARTMENT?

After operating as an incorporated, non-profit organization since 2003, RVL recently assessed its long-term service goals and determined the library could best serve the community as an official department within the Town of Raymond. The Board of Selectman were receptive to this idea and together with RVL have developed a mutually beneficial transfer agreement. As a result, one of the ballot questions on Raymond's town warrant will be whether the library should become a department of the town.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?

- Expanded free programming supporting all ages from infants to seniors
- Greater ability to support community outreach programs
- Would ensure standard operating hours and related consistent services
- Sustainability of funding for services
- RVL's assets and holdings would be entrusted to the town to support future library services
- Operating and staffing costs would be assumed by the town
- Retention of qualified library staff by providing healthcare and other employee benefits
- RVL Trustees and staff could focus efforts on programming instead of continual private fundraising
- All grounds keeping and building maintenance would be assumed by the town
- The library would realize a cost savings for insurance and other operational needs



HOW CAN YOU SUPPORT THIS EFFORT?

The RVL Board of Trustees, Board of Selectman, Budget-Finance Committee, and library staff UNANIMOUSLY HOPE that you will consider casting your vote in favor of this opportunity at the town election on June 14th. The Staff and Trustees of the Raymond Village Library look forward to the possibility of becoming a Town Department, creating new and exciting opportunities. *We invite you to contact us with any questions you may have and hope you will drop in to see what the library has to offer!*
