The Board employs O'Donnell and Associates, a private company, to assist with this effort. Employees from O'Donnell and Associates visit hundreds of properties each year to update values.

On many occasions, visits to residential properties occur when no one is home. The standard practice for assessing properties when no one answers the door or is not at home includes measuring the buildings, determining the quality and condition of the buildings (with the interior estimated through window views), and taking a picture.

Upon payment of the balance of the bid price, each successful bidder and purchaser will be issued a statutory short form municipal quitclaim deed by the Town of Raymond, and conveyance will be subject to such other liens or encumbrances as may appear of record, if any, tenancies or occupants, if any, and all applicable land use ordinances and regulations. Prospective bidders are encouraged to seek legal advice and examine matters of title and other matters as would be considered by an ordinarily prudent buyer.

# From The Office Of The Tax Collector

On September 21st the Board of Selectmen set the 1999-2000 year mil rate at 14.20. The tax bills will be going out the end of September, due the end of October. If you do not receive your tax bill, you may call 655-4742 to be sure it was mailed to the correct address.

There are currently two primary programs offered for tax relief:

The Circuit Breaker Program for tax or rent relief refund is for taxpayers who have an individual income of \$27,000 without dependents or \$42,100 with dependents. For the elderly, the maximum income to qualify is \$10,800 without dependents or \$13,400 with dependents. Forms are available at the Town Office. There is also an elderly, low-cost drug program for those who qualify. The forms can be filed anytime until March 1, 2000. You will need to know what you paid in property taxes for the 98/99 Tax Year.

The Homestead Program is also available if Raymond is your primary residence and you don't claim the Homestead Exemption elsewhere. This Program is an amount deducted from your assessed value and you are then taxed on the remaining valuation. You must apply for this program by April 1st to be reflected on the upcoming year's taxes. If you have applied for this program in prior years, you do not have to reapply for future years. In the 1998-1999 tax year the average tax bill, using a Homestead Exemption was approximately \$100 less.

# Change In Title Law By: Nancy Yates, Deputy Town Clerk

Effective June 10, 1999 Maine became a 15 year title state which means Maine will no longer title vehicles more than 15 years old. In 1999, 1984 vehicles are 15 years old and still require the title for registration purposes. As of January 1, 2000 they will be 16 years old and will be exempt from titling. In the year 2000, vehicles 1985 and newer will have to be titled.

# Recycling Drop-off Bins: Are You Really Recycling? Contamination at Drop-offs Spoils Recycling Efforts

Mixing the wrong materials in drop-off bins continues to be a problem at Raymond's drop-off locations at the Fire Station, and at Sherry Gagnon Park. Many entire loads have been rejected because of mixed materials, or unwanted materials- even trash!

It's Expensive! Contamination costs everyone in Raymond wasted tax dollars. Instead of saving money on trash disposal fees, we pay for the fee, and the hauling costs, and possibly extra transport fees in the future. Not only that, but contamination spoils the recycling efforts of others.

The Good News- Curbside recycling loads are coming in clean! Raymond has been complemented on the quality of its curbside loads. Until we can resolve the drop-off problem, this is the safest way to dispose of your recycled goods.

Please follow the Guidelines!- All of the drop-off bins are now equipped with signs to give users a better idea of what to put in each bin, as well as materials to avoid. Please follow these closely, and spread the word. Brochures are also available at the Town Office. If you don't follow the guidelines, you would be better off putting your recyclables in the trash!

#### What is Contamination?

Contamination is the placement of unacceptable materials in recycling drop-offs, or the mixing of different materials.

Well meaning citizens are causing problems by putting unwanted materials in the drop-off recycling bins. This so-called "contamination" may be as "harmless" as a brown paper bag that doesn't belong with newspaper. This can cause the rejection of an entire bin of material if it is serious enough. When materials are rejected they are burnt with other trash. Not only is this tragic from an environmental perspective, but Raymond also pays a tipping fee for all trash that is burnt.

Part of the problem is that people view recyclables as trash. In fact, recyclables are valuable resources, and must be purely one material to be worth anything in the recycling market. For example, any amount of metal in a load of glass (such as a light bulb) will render it worthless. Also, office paper may not seem that different from newspaper, but if mixed with a load of newspaper it can ruin the load.

Remember, recyclables are not trash, they are marketable resources if they are relatively clean and pure. We all have to do our part to assure that Raymond's recycled materials are marketable.
