Nathan Poore Accepts An Offer To Be The Town Manager Of Kennebunkport

(The following is a press release from the Town of Kennebunkport)

The Kennebunkport Board of Selectmen held a special meeting on August 28, 2000 to appoint Nathan Poore as the Town Manager of Kennebunkport. The Maine Municipal Association assisted the Board with the search for a new manager. The Town received approximately seventy applications for the position and a thorough screening process reduced the number to 16, then to five all of whom were interviewed. The Board unanimously selected Mr. Poore after the extensive

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search to replace former Town Manager, Jane Duncan who held the position for the past 16 years.

The Board has agreed to a threeyear contract beginning October 2, 2000 when Mr. Poore will begin his duties in Kennebunkport. Robert Sullivan, Kennebunkport Police Chief, will continue to act as the interim manager until Mr. Poore's arrival. Mr. Poore had notified the Raymond Board of Selectmen that he was discussing employment options with the Town of Kennebunkport, however a formal resignation was pending the outcome of a final decision by the Kennebunkport Board of Selectmen. Mr. Poore will be submitting his resignation to the Raymond Board of Selectmen on September 5, 2000.

Mr. Poore has been the Town Manager in Raymond since 1996 and

worked for the Town of Fryeburg as the Town Administrator from 1992 to 1996. Prior to Mr. Poore's experience at the helm of town management, he worked for the Town of Kennebunk in the Town Planning Office and as the Town of Arundel's first Town Planner. He earned a bachelor degree at the University of Maine and a master degree in Public Policy and Management at the University of Southern Maine.

Mr. Poore will be leaving Raymond with several accomplishments and a few ongoing projects for a new manager to complete. The Town is currently designing a new fire station. Through tax increment financing proceeds and a partnership with the Maine Department of Transportation, there is an extensive design process underway for improvements to Route 302 which will address a common landscape

theme, egress and access improvements, pedestrian and bicycle paths, lighting, traffic safety and general road improvements. The Town has recently partnered with the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to acquire and make improvements to Raymond Beach on Route 302. Most of those improvements have been completed.

Tim Pomerleau, Raymond Chairman of the Board of Selectmen has reported that he and the Raymond Board have mixed feelings about Mr. Poore's eminent departure. They do not look forward to losing Mr. Poore and feel as though he has been successful in Raymond; however, they support him taking on new opportunities and challenges if it is in his best interest. Mr. Poore has reported that he will provide whatever assistance is necessary toward making the transition smooth for Raymond.

RAYMOND ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DEDICATION SEE PAGE 3 Raymond Boat Launch Is Open – Beach To Open Next Year

The boat launch at Raymond Beach on Route 302 opened for business on August 9th. The Town and officials from the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife inspected the contractor's work on August 7th and found most of the work to be satisfactory with only a few items left to complete. It was decided that the remaining work would not interfere with opening the boat launch portion of the site. Already, boaters and anglers have got the word and use of the facility has increased over the past couple of weeks. This site was made possible from revenues received from anglers and boaters through the Federal Sport Fish Restoration Program, administered by the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.

The parking area and vehicle circulation routes are somewhat complex due to a number of one way travel areas and tight turning radii. First time users should use caution and try to follow the various signs indicating proper vehicle travel within the interior of the facility and the dedicated entrance and exits. The site is complex due to the tight layout of



the available property. The design took into account the tight layout and the need to maximize all available space. The Town has requested the Maine Department of Transportation to reduce the speed zone on Route 302 to improve safety for motorists and we expect to receive their findings on our request in the near future.

The beach portion of the site

will remain closed until next spring/ summer. The decision to keep the beach closed is due to two factors. First, the grass near the beach needs to be reestablished for erosion control and to have time to mature in order to handle heavy foot traffic. Second, the Town has submitted grant applications to the

With the beginning of the 2000-2001 school year Raymond marks the first of two major educationoriented goals with the opening of our new schools.

Raymond Elementary School will open its doors for children in grades Kindergarten through Four and be housed in our new school building. Mrs. Small represents a family with a long tradition in Raymond education. She has been a music teacher in the community, dedicating her life to giving Raymond children the joy of music. The parcel of land upon which the new elementary school is built was Small land. Currently Mrs. Small resides on the remaining parcel adjacent to the school.


Media Center: Carleton Edwards



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Percent For Art

The Percent for Art law was enacted in 1979 to provide for art in public buildings. Under the law, a maximum of \$40,000 may be used for art purchases in public schools. Since 1979 there have been more than 300 Percent for Art projects, resulting in the commissioning of over 1,000 works of art. Over 90% of Maine's schools now participate in this program to bring original works of art into the daily lives of children, staff, and the community.

The Percent for Art Selection Committee, with members Katie Hall (Jordan-Small School art teacher and committee chair), Barbara Conger (Elementary Building Committee), Barbara Smith (Maine Arts Commission Representative), Jessyka Broekman (Maine Arts Commission Representative), Barry Stallman (architect), and Paul Faria (Maine Arts Commission Staff) met in the fall of 1998 to review slides and to consider the kind of art for the new Raymond Elementary School. This committee identified that the art was to be a focal piece, involve and engage the children, be unique to our school, and that it must challenge the audience, both children and adult. The committee chose to look at artwork for both the interior and exterior of the school.

It was a very exciting and stimulating process to review slides of various art forms and media, and then to invite artists to interview and submit a design for the school. Two artists were selected to design original artwork. These are Auciello Stone and Melita Westerlund.

Joe and Shlomit Auciello of Warren, Maine created the large stone sculpture on the lawn area in front of the kindergarten wing. Standing on a grassy plateau are four granite stones. The inside faces of the stones are lettered with sayings and phrases, including the school's character values. Within the stones is a sculpture of a young child seated in the courtyard.

Melita Westerlund of Bar Harbor, Maine designed the beautiful POETRY GARDEN in the main entrance of the school. The hanging steel sculpture, as well as the painted walls, introduces both color and form to the building. Melita's wonderful use of color, whether viewed from the lobby or the media center, is both inspiring and stimulating.

We are proud to have the work of Auciello Stone and Melita Westerlund on permanent display in the Raymond Elementary School.

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Jordan-Small School Principal's Report By: Christian Elkington, Principal

As we move into the 2000-2001 school year I wanted to update you on some of the work that took place at Jordan Small School this past summer. Several of our 5th and 6th grade teaching staff worked on our math curriculum so that it would better align with our state's standards the Learning Results. This work is key as we develop our school's math curriculum over the next two years through the 8th grade. Other teaching staff worked on curriculum integration across subject areas to better support future student learning and understanding of concepts and skills taught at our school. In looking at building our school's middle level curriculum it will be most important for us to continue this work, and develop a curriculum that does not teach subjects in isolation. A curriculum that teaches and reinforces the skills and concepts that support student learning across differing subject areas supports greater student success.

This summer we also started short and long term planning for both transitioning into and developing a great middle level program for Jordan-Small School. Over the next two years we will be asking for your input and insight as we move from a grade 5-6 building this year to a comprehensive 5-8 middle school beginning in the fall of 2002. More information will be forthcoming over the next two months both, in the coming issues of Road Runner and on our community's web site.

Our school is ready for the 2000-2001 school year! Special thanks to our custodial staff for their efforts at getting our building ready during the transition to two schools! In my two months as the Jordan-Small School principal I have met several great kids, parents, guardians and community members. I have also started to get to know a fine, dedicated, caring staff of educators who will be supporting our community's students and families during this 2000-2001 school year. Changes In Lunch And Milk Prices At Raymond Schools

For the first time since 1989 there is a proposed increase in lunch and milk prices for the school lunch program in Raymond. Tuition Policy Reminder

As we begin a new school year, students and parents are reminded that School Committee policy requires that tuition students must remain enrolled in the school they have selected until the end of the academic year. Exceptions are made only if the administration and/or a PET determine that placement or programming is inappropriate. Approval of the Superintendent is required before such a change is made.

If you have made a change this summer, or are new to the community, please be sure our office has been informed and you have obtained a transfer form. The transfer of records and other data is done through the schools themselves. In all cases students are subject to academic and disciplinary procedures of the receiving school.

From time to time questions arise concerning the eligibility of students for tuition payments. In order for the Raymond School Department to accept responsibility for tuition payments, the family must reside in Raymond. Ownership of property alone is not sufficient. If there is a question, parents may be required to provide proof of residency. In addition, if a student moves out of our district in the course of the year, we are not responsible for continuing tuition payments. If arrangements have not been made with the receiving schools, parents may be responsible for the remaining tuition costs. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to call my office.

Portland Water District and the Department of Conservation for assistance with landscaping improvements and additional erosion control for beach stabilization. The Town expects to receive an answer with regard to the grant applications within the next couple of weeks. Plantings and stabilization efforts are expected to take place sometime in September. Anyone interested in helping the Town with plantings this fall, please call the Town Office (655-4742).

Some people are ignoring the "Beach Closed" signs at the facility, which is unfortunate. As people continue to use the beach while we attempt to make final improvements, it will take longer for the Town to officially open the beach. Anyone using the beach while it is posted and closed also run the risk of being arrested. So far, the Cumberland County Sheriff Department and Maine State Police have been assisting the Town through warning people to leave the beach area. We are hopeful that the warnings will work and no one will be arrested. Everyone should remember that the Town does have another facility for swimming at Tassel was taken to ensure compliance with all standards and regulations expected by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection. Silt fences were erected along the shoreline to prevent silt and fine material from reaching the lake. Silt booms were put in place around the boat launch area to ensure silt was contained in a small area and did to plume into the lake. The entire project design was reviewed and deemed to be acceptable by Department of Environmental Protection staff.

The improvements made to this site, in addition to reducing safety concerns, were also made specifically to protect the water quality of Sebago Lake. The drainage and erosion prevention plan, now in place, establishes specific grades for the surfaces that slope and direct runoff waters (and the phosphorus and other nutrients they carry) to infiltration trenches and away from the lake. These slopes address runoff water from Route 302 as well. The Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife invested additional funds to pave the parking areas, which went beyond the permit requirements of the Maine Department of Environmental Protection. This specifically ensured that

We have received several calls and written correspondences from residents who have been concerned with the project's compliance with environmental laws and regulations. Some have pointed out that the contractor used heavy equipment in the water. Others have recognized that the work has been completed during times of higher water and thought that the work should have been completed in the fall when water levels are lower. These are valid concerns, which the State and Town considered during the scheduling of the project. The primary reasons for starting construction activities during the summer months were safety, risk management and liability issues. The former owner of the property did not want the liability of owning the property for another summer and through the purchase and sale process conditioned the sale to occur before the summer season. Likewise, the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and the Town concluded that the facility did not meet safety standards for a public facility, therefore, construction activities were deemed to be the best method of closing the property. Every effort
