Buyer Of Northern Pines Property Considers Gift Of 22 Acres And Pavilion To The Town As A Possible Community Center

On August 9, 2000, Leo Blair, President of Envision Realty Corporation, presented a plan to the Raymond Planning Board. At the meeting Mr. Blair reported that he had intentions to establish property boundaries around four existing residential structures, create two undeveloped lots and donate the remaining land and Northern Pines Beech Hill Pavilion

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to a beneficiary. On August 10, 2000, the Town contacted Mr. Blair about his thoughts with regard to the Town of Raymond being the benefactor of the gift of the Pavilion and surrounding property. Mr. Blair agreed that the Town would be a suitable benefactor, and it was agreed that the Town would proceed with the development of a management plan for the property and secure authority through a special Town Meeting in November to accept the donation.

The ownership transfer will depend on whether Envision Realty Corporation executes an option to purchase the property and special town meeting consideration.

The Pavilion was constructed in 1992 with approximately 13,000 square feet on three levels. The first floor includes 24

Communities for Children Focuses on Middle School Transition

Greetings from Title I (Reading/Writing & Math)

We have finished our testing for now and have selected a large group of students for the 2000-2001 school year. Tutoring groups were scheduled and sessions began on Monday, September 11. Mrs. Milton and Mrs. Beers will be tutoring students in grades 1-6. I will be doing a literacy program (pre-reading skills) in the four Kindergarten classes, both morning and afternoon. I will also be tutoring some of the students in grades 1-4.

Following is the mission statement I developed this summer for Title I in the Raymond Schools. I hope it will provide a better understanding of the goals of Title I in this school system.

It is the task of the Title I tutor to:

- develop prior knowledge through real and vicarious literature experiences in order to broaden the child's vocabulary and help him/her make connections to his/her own life experiences.
- teach phonological/grapheme skills (such as Wilson Language & Concept Phonics) only as a tool for word attack with unfamiliar words, and help the child apply these skills with authentic, highly motivating texts that are slightly BELOW the child's comfort level.
- model good reading strategies through read-alouds with engaging, meaningful (and if necessary) controlled texts.
- encourage a variety of reading strategies through literature circles and discussion of picture/context clues.
- explore poetry, songs, and rhyming verse to help the child develop a sense of the 3 Rs (rhyme, rhythm, and repetition).
- to model strategies and shortcuts for completing math computations & problem solving with the ability to successfully apply these skills to curriculum-related math assignments.
- review/reteach math skills, if necessary, to rebuild prior math vocabulary and understanding.
- build the student's confidence so that he/she can work comfortably and independently within the classroom.
- guide the student toward good study habits.

The W.E.B. (Wonderfully Exciting Books) program is up and running now. The W.E.B. books are inside the Title I Reading/Math room now and we are attempting to manage the flow in a way that does not disturb the tutoring sessions that are going on in the room. It's exciting to have all the colorful and interesting display of books in one area where the students can browse and select a book to take home every day. We encourage all of our K-4 students to actively participate in this daily reading. The students may also receive credit for the books they take home from the school library or any library for that matter. We use Ziploc bags, 1 gallon size, for our W.E.B. program and would really appreciate any donations-they become quite wrinkled and torn after a while so we need to make new ones from time to time. Also, we welcome any donations of books that have fairly current titles for this program, especially books with easy texts and lots of rhyme and repetition.

Mrs. Beers has decided to launch a new reading program at the middle school this year. It is called Light Up Your Life-READ. The students will begin with a goal of 100,000 pages and we are even encouraging the staff to be involved. More information to follow in the coming weeks.

rental rooms with motel type accommodations. The second floor includes an office, a commercial kitchen, and one large meeting room that can accommodate approximately 250 people. The third floor includes space for storage. The property includes 22 acres of upland and sloping land with 500 feet of waterfront on Crescent Lake.

A Community Center Research Committee has been formed to identify possible uses of the property along with estimated costs and revenues associated with operations. The Committee met on August 21st and 28th and developed a preliminary plan for the facility, as well as an approach to gathering more public input. Committee members met with the current owner, obtained operational and cost data and plan to gather more information. On September 5 the Board of Selectmen approved a request from the Committee for \$5,000 for engineering assessment of the facility including any changes needed to the road and parking. The funds were requested to ensure that the Town makes an informed decision on whether to accept the gift of this property, which is valued at approximately \$1,000,000.

On Wednesday, September 27 representatives from town organizations met at the Jordan Small School Cafeteria to discuss community programs and space needs. The meeting included public input on the potential use of the Northern Pines Community Center. Information from the meeting will be compiled with cost and engineering data and presented to the public and the Board of Selectmen on October 17, 2000. If the committee's findings on the facility are favorable, a recommendation will be made at the October 17 meeting to hold a Special Town Meeting to accept the gift of the property from Envision Realty. The October 17 meeting will also include a public hearing to give the public an opportunity to be heard with regard to this project. We encourage people to attend this meeting and provide input to help us make the right decision.

The Jordan Small School staff is in the process of reading articles and reviewing research in support of our work to develop a rough draft middle school model. The focus of our work is to find and then incorporate student centered school programs and practices that help each student reach his or her fullest potential! We will not simply copy the examples we find but will instead improve upon them and recreate them to better serve our kids needs. We do not want to do what other middle schools do! We want to do what they do, better!

We will be asking for parental and community feedback in the coming months. We will call these meetings Middle School Programming Forums. At these forums we will present a rough draft of our best thinking on what our school could become. Middle School Development Committee Update By: Ellen Van Haasteren, Chair, Middle School Development Committee

The Middle School Development Committee has two major roles over the next several months in the development of the middle school program at Jordan-Small School. This committee is responsible for working with administrative staff and the architect on the renovations to transform the existing Jordan-Small School into a middle school. Secondly, this committee will function as a liaison between the school and the community as program ideas are developed.

The Middle School Development Committee met over the summer with the new principal, Chris Elkington, to review the renovation plan for Jordan-Small School, which will support a middle school program. The architect is now working on the final design and cost estimates for these renovations. We expect the bidding process for the construction to occur in December or early January with construction to begin in the spring.

The committee will be assisting the JSS staff with forums in October and November to obtain community input on some preliminary programming ideas. We encourage community members to attend these initial meetings in order to be part of the planning and implementation process for the middle school. Our committee is available to discuss ideas and concerns regarding the program and we will continue to provide updates as the program unfolds over the next several months. As I have said before, we have within our grasp a tremendous opportunity to create something very special for the young people of Raymond! This work will not happen overnight. It will in fact take several months of researching, visiting working models, discussing and review for it to grow. In year one of our work we will be building the foundation for 7th grade being added to Jordan-Small School in September of 2001. In year two we will continue our work in preparing for 8th grade being added in September of 2002!

I look forward to seeing many of you on October 26th and November 9th. Your input is needed to help support the growth and development of our new middle school program!
