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A Short History of the Raymond School System

Like all of the small, rural towns that surround Raymond, the history of its schools is one that began with its founding. When a town was established and incorporated, one of the first official acts was to set up and support a school. Because of the rural nature of Raymond and lack of transportation, a town like Raymond would have a number of schools that were set up wherever a population center existed. At one time Raymond had as many as fourteen. A school would hold two terms a year as long

as there were students and money enough to support a teacher. The district or section of town would elect or appoint an agent to oversee the running of the school within that district. These district schools continued until the late 1800's when the town took control of all of the schools within the town. At that time the town began a consolidation of schools as the population of the town declined greatly in the early 1900's. Anyone interested in reading the particulars on day-to-day life of these schools should pick up a copy of Ernest Knight's book, HISTORICAL GEMS of

RAYMOND AND CASCO, at the Raymond Village Library. Even better, get hold of some old Raymond Town Reports as they make very interesting reading.

Raymond never had a formal secondary school of its own but relied on other towns as well as private academies to educate its secondary students. Schools that our students attended varied from year to year, not much different than what is happening with our students today. In 1944 we had students at Gorham, Fryeburg Academy, Portland, Poland, Casco, Windham, No. Yarmouth

Academy, New Gloucester and Gray. Sound familiar? That year seemed to mark a different way of administering the elementary school. Fred Akins was appointed Superintendent of Schools in July of 1944. He was also the Windham Superintendent at the time, and it looks as if this might have been the beginning of School Union #15. Raymond was a member of this union until it was dissolved by Windham in 1975.

During the time that Raymond belonged to the Union, it still maintained a choice

Special Town Meeting, Tuesday, June 5th, 7:00pm, At The Raymond Elementary School Gym

For the past two years the Fire Station Building Committee has been studying the possibility of building a new fire station on the corner of Main Street and Route 302. This new facility would replace the existing District 1 station and is made possible by the generous gift of an 8.5 acre parcel from Mary Jane Karpoe. Detail project budget estimates are now being developed. The project has been refined over the winter and is proposed to be a five bay station. The building will be of wood frame construction with an asphalt-shingled roof. Plans include space for existing and future apparatus, adequate offices for departmental officers, sleeping quarters, a decontamination area, handicapped accessible bathrooms, and a meeting room for fire department training activities. The meeting room will include an adjacent kitchen, which could also be used as an emergency shelter and for future community events including public suppers. The Fire Station Building Committee will be putting the final touches on the design in the near future and will be scheduling public meetings to discuss project costs and building design features prior to the Special Town Meeting.

Another article will address a small piece of land abutting the 8.5 acres to be given to the town by Mrs. Karpoe. This land is now owned by the Maine Department of Transportation and was a part of the original Route 302 roadway. It is no longer needed by the State, so the Town can vote to discontinue it and increase the size of the parcel on which the new fire station will be built.

The possibility of extending the public waterline located

From the Garden Shelf Raymond Village Library

I'm sure many of you have read or heard about Maine's gardening magazine, People, Places and Plants, published by Paul Tukey in Falmouth. The magazine's theme, "If you can garden in Maine, you can garden anywhere", strikes a chord with any of us who till the soil, and promises to ring even more true this year. Never has spring been more eagerly awaited nor more thoroughly appreciated than here in the Lakes Region (a.k.a. the snowbelt). Though it may have been delayed by a few weeks, it has come, and with it a frenzy of garden clearing, soil preparation, planting and seed sowing as we try to catch up on the missed hours of daylight and warm weather we should have been enjoying. I cannot tell you how many dispirited people have asked me "Will we have flowers this spring?" or, "Have you ever seen a year like this one?" In twenty-eight years in the greenhouse and a lifetime of gardening, I honestly can't remember a winter/spring quite like this one.

By now, you have all been deluged with seed catalogs, gardening magazines and ads for lawn fertilizer and weed killer on TV. If that's not enough to get you thinking about the season ahead, there are a number of television programs as well as Internet sites to visit and generate some dream landscapes of your own. By far, the best source of ideas, plans, and great garden suggestions as well as answers to gardening questions or problems you might have experienced, is your local library. The Raymond Village Library has a great collection of books and periodicals to get you started. Included are the Time-Life series on the culture of a number of different plants, Jim Crockett's volumes on gardening indoors and out, some of Taylor's guides, books on just about anything a gardener would be interested in including perennials, vegetables, houseplants, roses, orchids, azaleas, trees, shrubs, books by Maine gardener Elliot Coleman, Rodale Press' Illustrated Guide as well as many others. Unlike the hot and dry summer of '99, last summer's cool and wet weather provided trees, shrubs and perennials with plenty of moisture for a great root growing season. Also, the abundant snow has provided one great advantage to perennial gardeners: no January thawing and heaving of our precious bulbs and perennials to worry about.

I'm not the meteorologist in the family, but I'm predicting a beautiful spring and summer. In the meantime, check out the library and start dreaming!

on Route 302 at the Windham Industrial Park to the Town of Raymond will also be considered. Raymond recently applied for and received approval of a \$400,000 Community Development Block Grant through the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development to facilitate this construction project. This block grant will be utilized to fund a portion of the construction cost of the extension along with additional funds raised by the town in the form of long-term bonds. At this writing it is anticipated that an additional \$400,000 will be necessary to complete the project. The debt retirement on this obligation will be retired through the proceeds of new development planned at Embedtech located at the CHIPCO manufacturing facility on Route 302 and within the Tax Increment Financing District. Approximately 3.1 million dollars in new property and machinery valuation will generate sufficient capital through taxation to offset the waterline debt. In addition a minimum of 40 new jobs will be created, with wages ranging from \$15 to \$20 per hour plus benefits, in the field of advanced manufacturing. All businesses and homes along the project route will be able to pay for connection in order to have public water. Another major benefit of the waterline project is improved fire protection by providing a reliable source of water for our fire trucks. The addition of public water on Route

302 in Raymond will also result in lower insurance premiums for nearby homeowners and businesses. Consideration has also been given to the possibility of extending the waterline further along Route 302 to the junction of Route 121 onto Main Street to the new fire station. The Board of Selectmen will study the viability of this extension in the near future.

A vote will be taken to fund an unanticipated shortfall in the Jordan-Small Middle School renovation project. The low bid received was \$79,600 over the project budget. Raising funds to cover this shortfall will enable the original scope of work first established by a Town vote on November 2, 1997, to be completed.

There will be a warrant article to rezone a portion of Map 4, Lot 18 in the Industrial Zone belonging to Richard and Cynthia Martin by extending the zone line back from the present 700 feet from Route 302 to 1000 feet. This change, if approved, would make the Industrial Zone at Martin Machine consistent with the zone in existence at Sabre Yachts.

The final article will be a change in the Annual Town



Raymond Mentoring Partnership

The Raymond School System will be welcoming an exciting new mentoring partnership this fall. The Raymond Mentoring Partnership is looking for adults who are interested in working with us to develop a supportive, caring relationship with a child or youth during the next school year. We are also collecting referrals of primary school children and middle school youth who would benefit from such a relationship.

The Mentoring Partnership became possible through a grant from the Maine State Office of Substance Abuse. Communities for Children members Lori Rand and Eileen Stiles initiated and wrote the request for funding, assisted by MaryAnn Amrich. The one-year grant will fund start-up costs, program administration, program activities, training and community education. Our goal is to match ten young people in each school with an adult mentor to meet weekly for at least an hour after school. We envision stronger partnerships growing in Raymond as adults, youth, schools and community connect in new ways.

While several volunteers have already expressed an interest in becoming mentors, we still need more adults who want to make a difference in a Raymond child's life. Mentors are people who can provide friendship, support and constructive examples of behavior. They are good listen-

ers and can help youth develop their strengths along with families, schools and the community. We ask for a commitment to meet weekly with a child during the school calendar year, attend training workshops, and participate in occasional group program activities. To address safety issues, we also ask that all mentoring volunteers consent to a background check.

If you would like to refer a student from Raymond Elementary School or Jordan-Small School, you may obtain a referral form from the school or by contacting the program coordinators below. The grant proposal is focused on helping those children who could use additional support in their lives due to limited resources. We may not be able to match every referral. Youth participants will be selected according to available mentors who can meet particular needs and the willingness of their families to be involved with the partnership. Families will be asked to participate in a meeting to understand the mentoring relationship expectations and attend at least two program events during the school year.

Nurse's Notes By: Jerilyn Ward, R.N.

Okay.... okay.... I have already been caught!! You all remember that beautiful, unexpected, record breaking, sunny day a week or so back that caught us all off guard. Well, my boys all came home that evening with sunburns. I was so upset to see their perfect white skin pink and hot. I realize the damage that can come with sun exposure. How could I have been so careless?

Why did this bother me so much? Well, because skin cancer is directly related to the amount of sun we are exposed to. Burning the skin where blisters can result actually doubles the likelihood of developing malignant melanoma, a terminal form of skin cancer. Chronic sun exposure causes premature aging in the form of wrinkles and age spots (protect your children, they will thank you later). Also, the development of cataracts has been linked to the amount of sun and UV damage that our eyes absorb. Remember 80% percent of the average person's exposure to the sun occurs before the age of 18.

What is a parent to do? Protect your child's skin, and don't expect them to always be responsible for applying the lotion themselves. After all, how responsible are adults? So many of us have placed our skin in danger time and time again. We hope for that healthy brown glow, only to burn our cheeks, peel our nose and have the appearance of wearing chronic white glasses. How attractive is that! Let's set an example for our children. I am amazed at how many adults I have come across that have had the experience of skin cancer and the emotional whirlwind that goes along with its removal and treatment.

Protection comes with the use of sunscreen, protective clothing, and UV protective sunglasses, even on cloudy days when those UV rays still can do their damage. Wearing a sunscreen with high sun protection factor (SPF) is recommended. The higher SPF numbers indicate greater protection. Sunscreen should be generously applied.

So what do we do when our children appear with sunburn on their delicate skin? Cool showers and applying wet, cool cloths are comforting. My mom used to use the home remedy of cool water mixed with white vinegar to lessen the sting. Tylenol and Ibuprofen may be used for discomfort as well. Use moisturizing creams or aloe based gels to soothe, but avoid Vaseline and creams with benzocaine that may cause allergic reactions. Most importantly call your health care provider if your child develops a fever, fluid filled blisters, dizziness or visual problems, which may indicate sun poisoning.

plan for its secondary students. Students were allowed to go to any school of their choosing, and the town would pay the State-set tuition rate. As time went by, more and more students began to go to school in Windham, as it was the biggest school in the union.





As more and more demands were placed on high schools to provide more varied educational opportunities to their students, the State offered inducements for towns to consolidate their high schools through the Sinclair Act. This act established the present School Administrative Districts that are pervasive throughout the state today. During the late sixties the town of Casco left School Union #15 to

become part of SAD #61, the Lake Region District. Raymond explored the possibility of also joining this district, but in the end opted to continue the status quo. The biggest hang-up seemed to be the perception that Raymond would pay the lion's share of the costs of the district even though it would have the fewest number of students. At about the same time a committee explored the possibility of forming a system between Windham and Raymond, but nothing came from it as the cost to Raymond was deemed to be too high. Another factor, in both cases, was that many people felt that having the ability to keep choice was very important.

During the 70's both Windham and Raymond grew quickly in population, and the educational needs of both towns grew as well. During this time the original school burnt to the ground. Classes were held at camp Hinds and Town Hall as well as in what remained of the school. Keeping school running while planning for a new addition to the school was a major task. Much time and effort was spent by the administration in this endeavor. In 1974 the Windham School Committee felt that the needs of Windham had outgrown its ability to share a school administrator with Raymond. To that end it voted to dissolve the school union that had well served both towns for many years. Beginning in July of 1975, Raymond was once again responsible for all its educational activities.

During the late 70's and early 80's, Raymond's school population grew exponentially. Jordan-Small School was hopelessly overcrowded. What is now the library and stage, held 6 classes. To alleviate this overcrowding the town explored and eventually tuitioned out the 7th and 8th grades, along with its secondary students. The elementary school finally had breathing room. During the early 80's, Windham began putting on the pressure to have Raymond send all of its students to its Middle and High Schools. Raymond, not wanting to give up choice, signed a non-exclusive contract with Westbrook. As a result of this, Windham dropped its demand to have all Raymond students attend its schools.

These times were the heyday for choice in Raymond. The majority of students were attending Westbrook. Many students were going to Cheverus and Catherine McAuley in Portland, (this ended when the Attorney General ruled that it was unconstitutional), as well as many other schools in the area.

During the 80's, on two different occasions, the Raymond School Committee held talks with Mechanic Falls, Poland and Minot, exploring the possibility of forming a School Administrative District or Community School District. Nothing came of those discussions. More discussions were held when Poland developed plans for its new high school, but we did not get involved.

Presently Raymond is in the process of bringing the 7th and 8th grades to its new middle school beginning this

fall. The board is keeping a close eye on the concerns that face us, as some parents feel that we may be limited in the number of schools that may offer to take our students. The board continues to look at all the options that are available to us at this time.





Greetings from Title I (Literacy/Math)

Kindergarten assessments are being completed with impressive results. More than 20 kindergarten students were able to read at least the first three books in the DRA(Developmental Reading Assessment), a literature-based assessment for Grades K-5. Many of them were able to go far beyond this level, putting them at the first, second and third grade level of reading achievement. We are all very excited about these positive and unexpected results.

First, second, and third grade assessments for Reading, Writing, and Math have also been completed by Mrs. Beers, Ms. Griffin, and myself. Mrs. Beers (Title I Ed Tech) and I will be looking at these assessments and other teacher generated data to determine our schedule for the year 2001-2002. We are also previewing samples from a program for comprehension development for the upper grades (Grades 3-7). The program series is called, "Soar to Success," and includes many colorful, interesting, and motivational short books with accompanying writing assignments and consistently taught lessons to encourage better strategy use at these higher-grade levels. The Maine Department of Education supports this series, and teachers all over the state have found this program to be an effective tool for addressing the needs of older students.

Our W.E.B. (Wonderfully Exciting Web) count is fast approaching the 300,000 page goal. One of the kindergarten students has read (or had read to him by someone at home) over 15,000 pages this year. Moving the W.E.B. program to the library has been an exciting change. The students enjoy spending that time selecting books from the wide variety in the library, and the atmosphere there certainly makes you want to read books! I have even made time in my schedule to help Mrs. Keef put books on the shelves one day a week because I love being in the library, surrounded by all the wonderful books!

Since we will not be having "Summer School" this year, we encourage you all to continue reading with your children as you travel and enjoy summer activities. We will be looking forward to hearing all about the summer adventures when the students return to school in August.
