On Saturday, July 14th, the Raymond Fire/Rescue Department provided safety support services for the annual Windham Rotary Club Poker Run/Boat Regatta. The Poker Run raises

thousands of dollars each year to support several local charitable foundations. This event also provided the Fire/Rescue Department with an opportunity to promote public safety by using the recently acquired surplus U.S. Coast Guard 27' Ambar 900 rigid foam, ribbed aluminum hull fire/rescue boat on Sebago Lake.

We are pleased to report the boat performed very well in all respects and will be a valuable long term fixed asset of the

The boat was acquired through the Maine State Surplus Property Program in Augusta with the endorsement and assistance of U.S. Senators Collins and Snowe, as well as Congressman Tom Allen. State Representative John Robinson and State Senator Bill Diamond also supported the town's acquisition efforts. Additional sponsoring agencies included Cumberland County government, Sheriff's Department and Emergency Management Agency, and the Portland Water District, as well as the towns of Casco, Naples, Sebago, Windham, Frye Island and Standish. The Portland Water District has already offered financial support to help monitor Sebago Lake for threats to our state's largest public drinking water supply.

Tax Reform

Rep. John C Robinson

As the first session of the 123rd Maine Legislature came to a close, a number of crucial issues were hotly debated.

One of the most important policy matters under scrutiny was the tax reform proposal.

During the final days of the session, L.D. 1925 was brought forth by the Taxation Committee as wide sweeping change in Maine's Tax Code. The title portrayed to cut taxes for Maine residents by \$140

million. However, in reality it was a massive broadening of the sales tax, which, had it passed, would have resulted in a colossal tax shift.

This broadening was of grave concern to me, especially with the past propensity of the majority in the Maine Legislature to increase spending above and beyond tax collections. Maine has made it an old habit of spending more than it takes in and then passing the bill on to the public in the form of new taxes.

Broadening the tax base is nothing more than a tax shift. Without ironclad constitutionally-imposed growth limits on government spending, what guarantees does the public have that new taxes created by broadening the base simply won't be used to fund growing programs or new expansions



of government?

Meaningful tax relief will come in the form of spending reductions, not in expanding the tax code. Expansive rewriting of the tax code that "broadens the tax base" is not the answer. It be time to shrink Government, not broaden its taxation powers.

I stand committed to my constituents to continue to be as fiscally responsible as possible. I believe the people of Maine expect no less from us than to spend their tax dollars wisely.

Municipal News Brief

The Raymond Board of Selectmen recently took the following actions:

Tuesday, July 10, 2007

 Community recognition of Raymond Olympian Kirsten Clark

Chairman of the Board of Selectmen Mark Gendron presented Raymond Olympian Kirsten Clark with the first ever "key to the town" in recognition of her international success as a three time Olympian, World Cup racer and for being the only American to win four straight U.S. downhill titles. Ms. Clark recently retired from competitive skiing after a thirteen year career. The Selectmen wanted to convey the town's pride in her personal accomplishments and to recognize the honor she brought to the Town of Raymond. Ms. Clark, in accepting the award, gave brief remarks highlighting some of her many career achievements and also thanked her family and the community for the support she had received over the years.

 Cumberland County Redistricting presentation and public forum – Assistant County Manager Bill Whitten

County Manager Peter Crichton appeared in Mr. Whitten's place and explained that a possible redistricting of Cumberland County to increase commissioner-tocitizen representation was a goal originally outlined in the county's 2001 strategic plan. Two proposals are presently being considered, the first is to increase the number of commissioners from the present three to five, and the second to increase the number of commissioners to seven. After consideration of these two scenarios, the Raymond Selectmen encouraged the county to recommend a redistricting plan with seven commissioners, but to redraw the geographic lines to align the Town of Raymond with other Lake Region communities, as opposed to communities along the Rt. 302 corridor extending from Portland.

After the County Commissioners complete their presentations, they will decide whether or not to offer citizens of Cumberland County the opportunity to vote on this initiative during November 2007.

 Applicant Interviews - Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee (three vacancies) – Patrick Cayer, Joseph Sousa and Richard Dodson

The first candidate to be interviewed was Pat Cayer, who highlighted his experience in the past as a member of the Planning Board and his experience in the field of surveying and planning. The second candidate, Joseph Sousa, outlined his experience in working on the Windham School Committee and his desire to participate in Raymond town government after attending the recent Annual Town Meeting. He told the Board of Selectmen he believed strongly in participating in his community and trying to make a positive difference as opposed to standing on the sidelines. Both candidates were unanimously approved for membership on the Comprehensive Implementation Committee. Candidate Richard Dodson, who was unable to attend the meeting but has been a Raymond resident for many years and was therefore well known to the Board of Selectmen, was also approved unanimously for membership on the Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee.

Additional recycling would also have a positive effect on the town's tip fee with the Mid-Maine Waste Action Corporation (MMWAC) in Auburn, because for every ton removed from the waste stream, the town would save \$29 in tipping fees. Although the Board of Selectmen elected not to go forward with single stream recycling at this time due to the increase in cost, they did encourage the Recycling Committee and the Town Manager to continue negotiations with Pine Tree Waste, and also Ec0-Maine, to find a cost effective solution that will allow the town to receive historical levels of recycling revenue, while at the same time implementing a single stream recycling program.

5) Discussion of digital Selectmen Agenda package proposal

The Town Manager outlined a proposal to begin to provide agenda packets electronically to the Board of Selectmen and to Raymond citizens via the website. This new process will be initiated with the August 7th meeting, moving forward. In the past, background materials for the Selectmen had been reproduced inhouse as paper 'packets,' which at times can be very large. The move to an electronic Selectmen packet will reduce the use of natural resources and also make some materials that had been previously unavailable to the public except by request available over the Internet. Files will be in PDF format, readable with the free program Adobe Reader, and normally will be posted by the Friday before each Tuesday meeting. (Selectmen meetings are normally held on the first and third Tuesdays of every month.) The Selectmen packets will be found in the same location that the meeting minutes are currently stored. From the Selectmen's page you will click the link 'Minutes & Packets,' and you will be taken to a calendar. Simply locate the meeting date, and you will have access to the packet as it becomes available; when approved, the minutes from that meeting will also be linked to that calendar date.

6) Capital reserve account request for database integration project – Contract Assessor Mike O'Donnell

The Town Manager outlined that this project had a \$5,000 budget allocation, which will need to be carried over in a capital reserve account for use during the 2007/2008 fiscal year. This funding is intended to cover the cost of linking the Vision, Northern Data Systems, and Fire House software and was approved unanimously by the Selectmen.

7) One Raymond Committee Update – Chair Mark Gendron

Chairman Mark Gendron informed the Selectmen that Selectman Dana Desjardins has stepped down from the One Raymond Committee and encouraged other interested Selectmen to step forward to serve on this committee. Selectman Lonnie Taylor said that he would serve on the One Raymond Committee as the second Selectman representative. Selectman Joe Bruno will serve on the inter-town committee that will negotiate the parameters of school consolidation. Chairman Gendron mentioned several upcoming issues for discussion by the One Raymond Committee, including the possibility of sharing contract Cumberland County law enforcement services with other communities, and issues related to possible utilization of Raymond's schools after consolidation occurs.

8) School Consolidation Committee

Selectman Joe Bruno reported briefly on the first school consolidation meeting with Windham, which included School Board Chairman Teresa Sadak, School Board representative Roger Ginn, and resident State Representative John Robinson. This committee is cochaired by Raymond Superintendent Sandra Caldwell and Windham Superintendent Sandy Prince. The first meeting was primarily organizational in nature, with the second meeting to be scheduled for July 26th at 5pm at Windham High School. At this meeting there should be some fiscal information to share and discuss. Raymond is also looking at other schools, including Poland and Westbrook, as possible educational program partners. A notice of intent regarding school selection needs to be submitted to the Maine Department of Education by August 31st. In the future there will need to be a decision about whether Raymond continues to have high school choices or not. At this point Selectman Bruno did not see a great deal of savings under any consolidation scenario. The reason for Raymond's unfavorable position is related to the town's relatively high real

estate valuation to student ratio, as compared to other partnering communities. Another issue to be factored in is the possibility of added costs that may be incurred through consolidation of educational staff, who under consolidation can elect to vote as to which community's or district's contract they wish to accept.

 Executive Session – Discussion fiscal year 2007/2008 Town Manager contract as authorized under Title 1 M.R.S.A. § 405(6)(A)

The Board of Selectmen went into Executive Session at 8:30pm with the Town Manager to discuss his contract renewal. The meeting was re-opened by Chairman Gendron at 8:44pm. A motion was then made by Selectman Joe Bruno to approve the Town Manager's contract, which will be effective July 1, 2007. This motion was seconded by Selectman Dana Desjardins and approved unanimously.

10) Old Unfinished Business

The Town Manager was directed to put the town's former public safety boat up for sale at the Veterans Memorial Park, and also to advertise it through the town's website, craigslist.org and other no-cost sales venues in an effort to sell this vessel as soon as possible. It is expected that it will be in the park for no more than a one week period.


11) Town Manager Report and Communications

The Town Manager reminded Raymond citizens that there will be a Special Town Meeting on August 7, 2007, at 7 pm, at the Digital Broadcast Studio primarily to consider housekeeping changes to the Raymond Land Use Ordinance.

The Town Manager also presented the Board of Selectmen with the annual State of Maine Department of Transportation Urban Rural Initiative Program (URIP) form for signature or delegation. A motion was made by Joe Bruno to authorize the Town Manager to sign this commitment on behalf of the Selectmen, signifying that Raymond would expend an amount of money of at least \$62,800 in the FY 2007/2008 budget cycle for local road work in order to receive this same amount in state funding. This motion was approved unanimously.

4) Single stream recycling presentation and proposal – Recycling Committee Chair Phil Hammett

Both Recycling Committee Chair Phil Hammett and the Town Manager had intended to recommend moving forward with single stream recycling. Recently however, recycling pickup contractor Pine Tree Waste had indicated that the additional cost for single stream recycling would be higher than anticipated. The cost now would be about \$13,000 additional, as opposed to the \$3,000 that had been planned. Single stream recycling would enable residents to recycle additional materials and to mix them all together in their recycling bins. The most notable change with single stream recycling would be the addition of the curbside pick up of cardboard. The elimination of the present cardboard collection site would result in a small savings for the town but a significant increase in convenience to residents, eliminating their making a special trip to the site. Single stream cardboard recycling would, therefore, save energy resources for the community as a whole.

Dogs Like the Water

Dogs like the water, but keep in mind the people around you and the wildlife dogs might endanger. Dogs and all animals are not allowed on Raymond's public beaches because of health concerns and the fact that some people don't like or are afraid of animals.

Some dogs like riding in boats, but please be aware that a day of boating can be very stressful for them from heat, dehydration (lack of water), and exposure to the sun. Putting your dog in for a swim from a boat does not necessarily mean that it has had enough to drink or had its body temperature reduced enough for a long day in the sun. The long boat ride can also be very stressful in your pet's need to evacuate itself.



Parents: the Most Important Influence in a Child's Life


Research shows that parents are central to preventing teen alcohol/drug use. In fact, kids themselves say that losing their parents' trust and respect is the most important reason not to use alcohol/drugs. In several studies, kids have also said that if their parents asked them about their alcohol/drug use, they would be so relieved to unburden themselves that they would tell their parents the truth. So if you suspect, or know, that your child has been drinking or using drugs, initiate a discussion with your child immediately. Start by telling your teen that you LOVE him/her and are worried that he/she might be using drugs or alcohol.

During this discussion, try not to get mad or accuse your child of being stupid or bad or an embarrassment to the family. In addition, try not to make the discussion an inquisition; simply try to connect with your teen. Knowing that kids are naturally private about their lives, try to find out what's going on in your child's life that might have led him/her to use alcohol/drugs. Find out if friends or others offered your child alcohol/drugs at a party or at school. Did they try it out of curiosity, or did they take initiative to use alcohol/drugs for some other reason? Also ask: When was the last time he/she used alcohol/drugs? What exactly are they using, how much, and how often? And has he/she done anything that they regret?

After hearing them out and learning all you can about their usage, say that you KNOW that drugs may seem like the thing to do, but drinking and using drugs can have serious consequences. And that it makes you FEEL worried and concerned about them. Also, be sure to express that you are there to LISTEN to them. However, you should also make it clear that you WANT them to stop drinking/using drugs and that you are willing to HELP them to do so. Even if your child continues to use alcohol/drugs after your discussion, if they learned from that talk that they can trust you, they will turn to you for help when they are ready to stop or when they get into trouble.

It is also important for you to know that if you are a parent struggling with this issue, you do not have to battle this alone. There are licensed alcohol & drug counselors ("LADC") in our community that specialize in working with teenagers and who can assist you in a variety of ways. For example, if your discussion with your teen does not go as well as you planned, you can make an appointment for your child to talk to the therapist instead. Oftentimes, it is easier for kids to talk with a stranger about issues they may feel some shame about than to talk with their parents. Conversely, if your talk goes well and you need help learning about treatment options for your child, the therapist can perform an evaluation on your child and then recommend the best treatment option for him or her. Lastly, if your child refuses to stop using or to get help, as the parent of this teen, you can go to counseling to get expert advice on how to handle the situation with your teen in addition to having a safe, supportive place to unburden your feelings about what is happening.

AUGUSTA - State Rep. John Robinson (R-Raymond) announced today that the application period for Maine's Property Tax and Rent Refund Program will begin August 1st for taxes and rent paid during 2006. He encourages Maine homeowners and renters to take advantage of this under-utilized program, which provides cash to help residents cover their property taxes.

The Property Tax and Rent Refund Program, also known as the "circuit breaker," is the state's primary tax assistance program. Mainers who qualify may be eligible for refunds up to \$2,000.

According to Rep. Robinson, thousands of Mainers who could have received refund checks in the past did not even apply. Maine Revenue Services (MRS) estimates that approximately 200,000 Maine households qualify for the program. In 2005, however, only 120,615 households applied and 93,915 qualified, receiving a total of \$44.3 million.

Under the guidelines, you may qualify for a refund if you do not have a spouse or dependents and your 2006 income was \$77,000 or less. If you have a spouse and dependents, you could have made up to \$102,000 in 2005 and still qualify.

To receive a refund, your 2006 property tax must have exceeded four percent of your income. Renters qualify if the rent they paid in 2006 exceeded 20 percent of their income. Seniors do not have to meet those requirements, however, if their household income is below \$12,700 for those living alone or below \$15,700 for those living with a spouse or dependent.

The Maine Environmental Depot at the Lewiston Solid Waste facility, 424 River Road in Lewiston, will accept hazardous waste from Raymond. Their web address is www. envdepot.com or www.avcop.org and the phone number is 783-9186.

Directions: From I-95, take Exit 80 (southbound, take a LEFT off the ramp and go under the turnpike, northbound, take a RIGHT off the ramp). About ³/₄ of a mile down, turn left on River Road just after the Wal-Mart Distribution Facility. Lewiston Solid Waste is about a half mile on the left. Proceed through the main gate by the scale house and around the main building. The Depot will be in front of you.

The Depot is open the FIRST and THIRD Saturdays of each month from APRIL through NOVEMBER. Hours are from 8am to 1pm. If the Saturday falls on a holiday weekend, the Depot WILL BE CLOSED.

PAYMENT: Each unit of 5 gallons, 20 pounds, or combination thereof will be charged \$27 CASH PER UNIT.

ITEMS ACCEPTED but not limited to: aluminum cleaners, bug sprays, drain cleaners, floor care products, furniture polish, metal polish with solvents, oven cleaners, cutting oil, solvents and solvent based glues, oil based paint, stain and varnish, paint (auto and marine), paint brush cleaning solvent, paint thinners and strippers, primers and wood preservatives, auto body repair products, auto transmission fluid, battery acid, brake fluid, car wax with solvents, driveway sealer, engine degreaser, gasoline, kerosene or diesel fuel, roofing tar, weed killer, chemical fertilizer with pesticides, fungicide, insecticide and pesticide, rat poison, chemistry sets, dry cleaning solvents, fiberglass epoxy, flea control products, formalin, formaldehyde, gun cleaning solvents, hot tub chemicals, light fluid, moth balls, photographic chemicals, rubber cement, rug, upholstery and spot cleaners, swimming pool chemicals.

ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED: Latex paint (dry paint and cans go to bulky waste), waste motor oil (clean oil can go to bulky waste free of charge), alkaline batteries (throw in trash), biological waste (ask your doctor), compressed gas cylinders (small 4# canisters can go in trash and large ones to distributor, explosives and ammunition (ask at gun shop or sporting goods store), and prescription medicines and syringes (ask doctor).

How to deliver:

- Pack materials in original, secure containers; use boxes or plastic bags when appropriate.
- Place materials in trunk or truck bed.
- Drive up to the Scale House at the River Road site.
- Enter the Depot when directed.
- Remain in your vehicle.
- Pay in cash only.
